Collecting American Political History

SECOND IN COMMAND

John Adams

In 1789, John Adams became the first Vice President of the United States under the country's first President, George Washington. The Vice President of the United States is the second-highest officer in the executive branch of the federal government after the President of the United States. Although the position of Vice President did not exist under the Continental Congresses or the Articles of Confederation, the framers of the Constitution used policies from state governments to establish it in the new Federal government. Before the Revolution, lieutenant governors presided over the governors' councils of the royal colonies, which also acted as upper houses of the legislatures. This system was adapted in some states after the Revolution, such as in New York, where the lieutenant governor presided over the state senate.

There have been 50 U.S. VPs since the office was created in 1789. We got our 50th on Election Day in November. Originally, the Vice President was the person who received the second-most votes for President in the Electoral College. But after the election of 1800 produced a tie between Thomas Jefferson and Aaron Burr that required the House of Representatives to choose between them, lawmakers passed legislation to prevent a recurrence. Originally electors cast a separate ballot for the presidency and the Vice Presidency. Amendment Twelve to the Constitution was ratified on June 15, 1804. It revised the procedure of how Presidents and Vice Presidents are elected, specifically so that they are elected together. Previously, this system elected the candidate with the most electoral votes to become the President, while the candidate with the second-highest number would become Vice President.

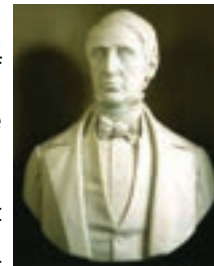
That Amendment also provides that "no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President [such as having served two full terms] shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States." The Vice President constitutionally has two official roles: to succeed the President if the President dies, resigns, or is removed from office; The Vice President may also become the 'Acting President' if the President cannot perform the duties of his office temporarily. In addition, the Vice President also serves as president of the Senate and is empowered to break any tied votes.

The average age for those who entered the Vice Presidency is 54.8 years. John Adams and Hubert Humphrey were this age when they became Vice President under Thomas Jefferson and Lyndon Johnson respectively. The VP is first in the line of presidential succession. Two Vice Presidents—George Clinton (Jefferson & Madison) and John C. Calhoun (John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson) held office under two different Presidents. Of those who ascended to the presidency, nine were elevated to the office on the death of a president and five of those were later elected to the office in their own right.

The youngest person to become VP was John C. Breckinridge (left), at the age of 36 years, 47 days. Serving only one term, he became and still the youngest at the time of leaving office; the oldest at the time of entering office was Alben W. Barkley (Truman), at the age of 71 years, 57 days. Ailing with tuberculosis and recovering in Cuba on Inauguration Day in 1853, William Rufus King (L-Franklin Pierce), by an Act of Congress, was allowed to take the oath outside the United States. He is the only Vice President to take his oath of office in a foreign country.

Before the 25th Amendment was adopted in 1967, an in-term vacancy in the office of the Vice President could not be filled until the next post-election inauguration. Eight such vacancies occurred: seven VPs died, one resigned and eight succeeded to the presidency. This amendment allowed for a vacancy to be filled through appointment by the President and confirmation by both the House and Senate. Since its ratification, the Vice Presidency has been vacant twice (both due to scandals during the Nixon years) and was filled both times through this process — following Spiro Agnew's 1973 resignation and again in 1974 after Gerald Ford succeeded to the presidency. The amendment also established a procedure allowing a Vice President to temporarily assume the powers and duties of the office as Acting President if necessary. Three VPs have briefly acted as President under the 25th Amendment: George H. W. Bush on July 13, 1985; Dick Cheney on June 29, 2002, and on July 21, 2007; and Kamala Harris on November 19, 2021.

John Adams called the Vice Presidency "the most insignificant office that ever the invention of man contrived or his imagination conceived." FDR's first Vice President, John Nance Garner, was famously quoted as saying it wasn't "worth a bucket of warm spit" (though his exact words remain disputed). Thomas Marshall said, "I was the Wilson administration's spare tire - to be used only in case of emergency." Two Vice Presidents, Hannibal Hamlin (Lincoln) and Henry Wallace (FDR), were dropped from the ticket after their first term, only to see their successors become President. Prior to the 1960 election, Lyndon Johnson said he was "not interested in the Vice Presidency," saying he "wouldn't want to trade my vote for a gavel." According to records, "In Truman's 82 days as Vice President, he didn't get a single intelligence briefing."

For over a century early Vice Presidents largely spent almost all of their time presiding over the Senate and concentrating on legislative (Continued on page 16...)

TWEED ROOSEVELT, University Professor, Chairman of the Theodore Roosevelt Institute and President of the Society of Presidential Descendants, is the great-grandson of President Theodore Roosevelt, a member of one of the most respected families in the United States.



Tweed Roosevelt led the effort to award President Theodore Roosevelt the Congressional Medal of Honor, the United States' highest military honor. President Bill Clinton formally awarded the Medal posthumously, in 2001. The award is prominently displayed in the White House's Roosevelt Room, adjacent to the Oval Office.

Tweed Roosevelt has taught at Harvard University and Columbia University's School of Business. He holds a BA from Harvard College, an MBA from Columbia University, and a Doctorate of Humane Letters.



Over the years, Mr. Roosevelt has done much to further the memory and ideals of Theodore Roosevelt. He has lectured and taught about TR at numerous institutions and schools around the world, including Harvard, Marshall, and Santa Clara Universities, ranging from single lectures to a 20-hour course that involved as guest speakers most of the well-known historians of TR. He has also lectured on a wide range of other subjects, including conservation and the environment, hunting, politics, literature, history, mathematics, Japanese-American relations, and exploration, and has retraced many of

TR's adventures in the American West, Africa, and the Amazon. He has appeared on numerous television documentaries and radio programs and was awarded the prestigious Telly Award for his public service announcement on Presidential log cabins.

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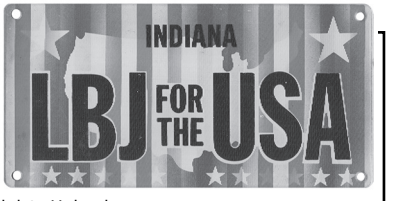

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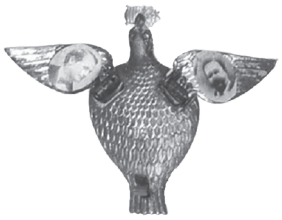

This year, Anderson Auctions of Troy, Ohio closed their sale #211. Here we will take a look at many of the interesting items that sold in the \$1200 and up range. A cardboard "bang gun" supporting Warren Harding for president, Jake Preus for governor and various other Minnesota candidates in 1920 shot up to \$1180 (all prices realized include an 18% Buyer's Premium and are rounded to the nearest dollar.) A 7/8" Hoo But Hoover California Poppy Pin grew to \$1265. Beautifully framed was a Roosevelt, Garner Tire Cover which rolled to \$1380.

Pin-back buttons did well in the sale, an I'm for Harry Truman unusual picture cello measuring 1 3/4" sold for \$1380. Manufactured in Indianapolis was a 1 1/4" McKinley, Bryan Eclipse Pin which set at \$1416. Truly classic, a Roosevelt, Garner for Repeal and Prosperity jugate picture button flew to \$1495.



Bryan, Sewall Silver Bird Mechanical Pin complete with a tiny gold bug in its beak managed \$1495. Picturing hos farm at Ashland, Kentucky was a Henry Clay 1884 Whig Convention Ribbon which was gaveled down at \$1495. A Smith, Comstock Michigan Coattail Badge in great condition got to \$1652.

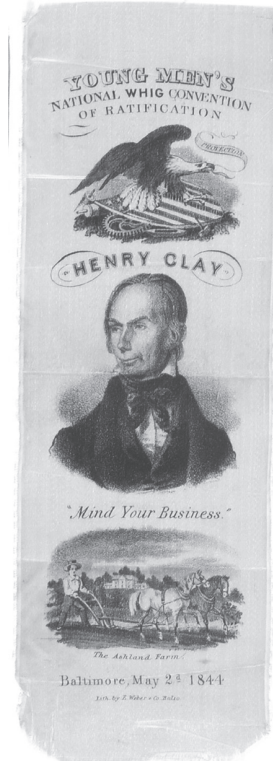
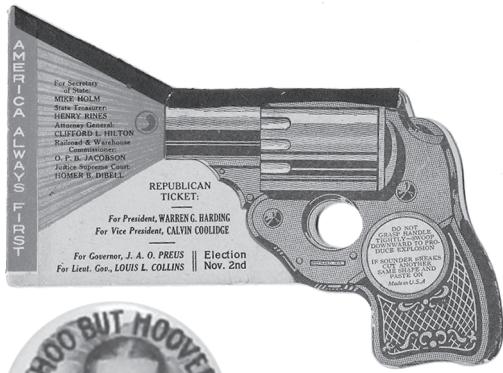
An attractive McKinley-Roosevelt jugate poster from 1900 was tacked up at \$1770. Next is a highly sought-after 7/8" pin picturing the youthful Harry Truman running for Eastern Court District Judge in Missouri - with an \$1840 judgment. Measuring 1 1/4" was a Debs, Harriman 1900 Socialist Jugate which ended at \$1888.

With a little aging was a Charles Fremont, William Dayton rare 7 inch anti-slavery jugate ribbon from 1856 that came in a \$1955. Small but mighty, a Harding, Coolidge Rare 1920 Jugate peaked at \$2006. Another great ribbon, a Van Buren Old Democratic Northern Liberties Ribbon was chased to \$3450.



Hard to find was a Davis and Bryan Rare 1924 7/8" Jugate which found a new home at \$4025. Another rare pin was a Roosevelt, Johnson 1912 Progressives Jugate which did even better at \$4888. Some light spotting afforded one bidder the opportunity to add a Roosevelt, Booker T. Washington Equality Pin to their collection for \$5463.

Seldom offered, a Taft Our Presidents Past, Present and



Future picturing Taft, McKinley and Roosevelt which measured 1 1/4" got to \$5750.

The two top selling pins of the day, both pictured Thomas Watson of Georgia who was the Populist Party candidate for president in 1904 and 1908. First, a rare 1 1/4 inch celluloid with a mention of his state as well as his image rose to \$6325. Finally, the biggie of the day was an exceptionally rare third-party campaign pin picturing Populists Watson and VP nominee Thomas Tibbles. It greatly exceeded expectations with an \$8625 result.

MASSEE MCKINLEY's paternal ancestor is the 25th US President William McKinley. He is the great-great nephew of McKinley. McKinley's maternal ancestor is the 22nd and 24th US President Grover Cleveland. McKinley is the founding partner of Peerage Communications, LLC, an executive and political communications boutique consulting firm headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia. He has written for the likes of Delta Airlines, The Coca-Cola Company, LVMH (Louis Vuitton), Hermès and Ferragamo. McKinley has also written for three former United States House Speakers.



LYNDA JOHNSON ROBB's passionate interest in children's literature led her more than 50 years ago to volunteer to read to children in hospitals, where she discovered that many children wanted and needed books so badly that hospital staff let them take home the books she brought to read. This experience prompted her involvement in 1968 to become a founding member of the Board Reading is Fundamental (RIF) and worked on the board until 2013.

From 1996 until 2001, she served as the Chairman of the RIF Board of Directors. He is currently portraying his grandfather in the one-man stage show, *Give 'Em Hell Harry*, as well as writing and lecturing on the Truman presidency.

matters. But more recent Vice Presidents have taken a more active role, serving as trusted aides and advisors to the President, representing their administration on important policy issues, both foreign and domestic, going far beyond those specific duties outlined in the U.S. Constitution. In general, their role as an advisor has become their most significant function.

However, it isn't just about agreeing on political or policy decisions. Presidents cannot just fire their Vice President like they can a member of their Cabinet, so their working relationship is critical. One writer put it succinctly: *"It's at least a four-year marriage, so you better be cautious about who you select because compatibility, establishing and maintaining a relationship truly matters"*.

The first big change to the Vice Presidency came during the Eisenhower administration. Ike moved the Office of the Vice President into the executive branch. But the greatest change to the status the Vice Presidency came from President Jimmy Carter, who involved his Vice President — Walter Mondale — into the daily operations of the West Wing for the first time in history.

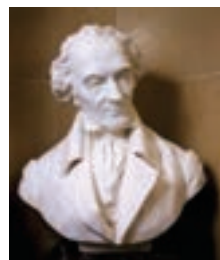
President Carter met with Vice President Mondale each week, invited him to government meetings, gave him staff support and told White House aides to *"treat a request from Mondale the same as one from himself"*.

Jimmy Carter believed that the Vice Presidency had been a wasted asset and it was his responsibility to make certain that his VP was completely prepared to assume the presidency if needed. He conducted the most intensive search for a running mate up to that time, with background checks, consultations with many Americans, and interviews with seven finalists. In Senator Walter Mondale (D-Minn.), Carter found an extraordinarily able running mate who was politically and personally compatible.

Carter and Mondale did not always agree on policy or tactics. But Carter involved Mondale in most of his decisions and welcomed his advice, even on critical events. He solicited Mondale's views and included Mondale in campaign briefings and press conferences, frequently including him in speeches and in significant meetings.

Mondale's term marked the first time a Vice President served as a central part of White House decision-making and implementation on an ongoing basis. Carter's five successors—three Republicans and two Democrats—have differed in their approaches to the presidency, their ideologies and their personalities. Yet each has adopted the central features of the Vice Presidency Carter and Mondale created.

When Ronald Reagan defeated Jimmy Carter in the 1980 election, Reagan's Vice President, George H.W. Bush, stated in an a New York Times interview that he hoped to follow his predecessor's approach to his new job, noting that the *"Mondale model is a very good model [for the Vice Presidency]"*. This idea of a more active, more influential Vice President would become the outline for future administrations.

To some of the framers of the Constitution, appointing the Vice President as the president of the Senate violated the concept of separation of powers. Elbridge Gerry (left), who would later serve as Madison's Vice President, declared that the framers *"might as well put the President himself as head of the legislature."* As it turned out, prior to the 20th century Vice Presidents rarely attended cabinet meetings or even became involved in executive branch business.

Just how much VPs were involved in Senate activity as the upper body's president varied throughout the 19th Century. John Adams played an active role, lobbying senators to vote against legislation he opposed and frequently lecturing Senators on procedural and policy matters. Thomas Jefferson devoted his four-year term to preparing his Manual of Parliamentary Practice, which he hoped would allow him and his successors to preside over the Senate with *'fairness, intelligence, and consistency'*. John C. Calhoun of South Carolina, who served as Vice President under both John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson, took an active role in Senate business. A scrupulous guardian of the Senate's written rules, he greatly disapproved the lack of respect given to its unwritten customs and practices.

Some Vice Presidents, such as George M. Dallas, Levi P. Morton, and Garret A. Hobart, studied the Senate's rules and precedents and presided successfully. Others were less engaged with the daily work of the Senate. Henry Wilson, who served as Ulysses S. Grant's second VP, used his time in office to write a three-volume history of the opposition to slavery during his tenure. It was incomplete when he died in his Capitol office in 1875.

The Vice Presidency in the 19th century seldom led to the White House. Of the 21 individuals who held that office from 1805 to 1899, only Martin Van Buren was subsequently elected president. Four others succeeded to the presidency when the incumbent died, none of whom later won election in their own name.

Before becoming president, Joe Biden served as President Barack Obama's Vice President for eight years and acknowledged the importance of being both an active participant in the Oval Office and second chair to the president. *"It seems to me the most significant thing that has to occur,"* Biden stated on MSNBC in 2016, *"You have to be simpatico ideologically with the president and you have to understand there's a 'V' in front of your name. You're the Vice President."*

Indiana elected Mike Pence to Congress six times. He helped make government smaller, more effective, and returned powers to the state and local governments. He was elected Governor of Indiana in 2013, and his record of

legislative experience, along with family values, prompted Donald Trump to select Mike Pence as his 2016 running mate and subsequently as Vice President. Pence also famously stood up to Trump in the waning days of Trump's presidential term, when on Jan. 6, 2021, Pence refused to block the certification of the 2020 presidential election results, which had made Biden the winner.

On January 20, 2021, Kamala Harris was sworn in as Vice President – the first woman, the first Black American, and the first South Asian American to be elected to this position. As Vice President, she has led the right to live safe from gun violence, the freedom to vote, and the freedom to drink clean water and breathe clean air. While making history at home, she also represents the nation abroad – embarking on more than a dozen foreign trips, traveling to more than 19 countries, and meeting with more than 150 world leaders to strengthen critical global alliances. On July 21, 2024, Vice President Harris announced her 2024 campaign for President with Minnesota Governor Tim Walz as her running mate. ELECTION DAY, Tuesday, November 5, 2024, gave us a new President (Donald Trump) and Vice President (J. D. Vance).

Incidentally, the U.S. Congress has a complete set of ceramic busts of every individual who has served as the Vice President of the United States. The Senate's Bust Collection is a significant part of the Senate's fine art collection. The Joint Committee on the Library of Congress, acting under a resolution of May 13, 1886, began commissioning busts of the Vice Presidents to occupy the niches in the new Senate Chamber. After the first busts filled the locations that surrounded the Chamber, new additions were placed throughout the Senate wing of the Capitol. The collection documents the individuals who have served as Vice President and pays tribute to their role as president of the Senate. As of this time, busts of Vice Presidents Joe Biden, Michael R. Pence, and Kamala Harris have not been completed. J.D. Vance's bust has not yet been commissioned.



US Navel Observatory at Number One Observatory Circle refurbished the house to serve as a residence for the Vice President by 1974 agreement with Congress.

The United States Naval Observatory at Number One Observatory Circle in northwestern Washington, D.C. (left) was built in 1893. Historically, Vice Presidents and their families lived in their own homes, but in 1974 Congress agreed to refurbish the house at the Naval Observatory as a home for the Vice President.

Three years passed before any Vice President actually lived there.

Vice President Gerald Ford acceded to the Presidency before he could use the home, and his Vice President, Nelson Rockefeller, only used it for entertaining. Walter Mondale was the first Vice President to move into the home. since that time, it has been home to the families of Vice Presidents Bush, Quayle, Gore, Cheney, Biden, and Pence. Vance will join this list on Inauguration Day 2025. Incidentally, the Vice President's salary is \$400,000 per year. The Vice President also receives an expense allowance of \$50,000.



In addition to the Vice President's Office in the West Wing, the Vice Presidents and their staff maintain a set of offices in the Eisenhower Executive Office Building (EEOB), located next to the West Wing of the White House. This office, called the Vice President's Ceremonial Office, was originally used as the Secretary of Navy's office from 1879 to 1923. From 1923 to 1947, General John Pershing occupied the office initially as the Army Chief of Staff then as the Chairman of the Battle and Monuments Commission, becoming the longest single occupant of this room (24 years). Additionally, President Hoover used the office for three months following a Christmas Eve fire in the West Wing in 1929.

Since 1960 it has been used as the Vice President's Ceremonial Office with the exception of Vice President Hubert Humphrey, because Lyndon Johnson did not give up the office when he became President after the Kennedy assassination.

One of the more historical items in the room is the Vice President's Desk. According to the White House Archives, this desk is part of the White House collection, was constructed in 1902 and was commissioned to be built for Theodore Roosevelt's use in the Oval Office. Several important figures have used the desk including Presidents Taft, Wilson, Harding, Coolidge, and for a few months, Hoover. The desk was placed in storage early on during Herbert Hoover's Presidency where it remained until 1945 when President Truman then used it. Vice President Lyndon Johnson and all subsequent Vice Presidents (except Hubert Humphrey) have used the desk. Since the 1940s, various users have signed the inside of the top drawer, including: Vice Presidents Biden, Cheney, Gore, Quayle, G.H.W. Bush, Mondale, and Rockefeller; and Presidents Truman and Eisenhower.

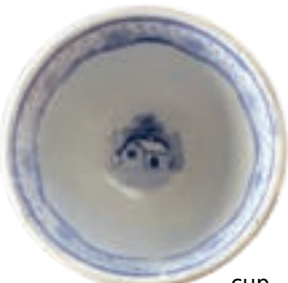

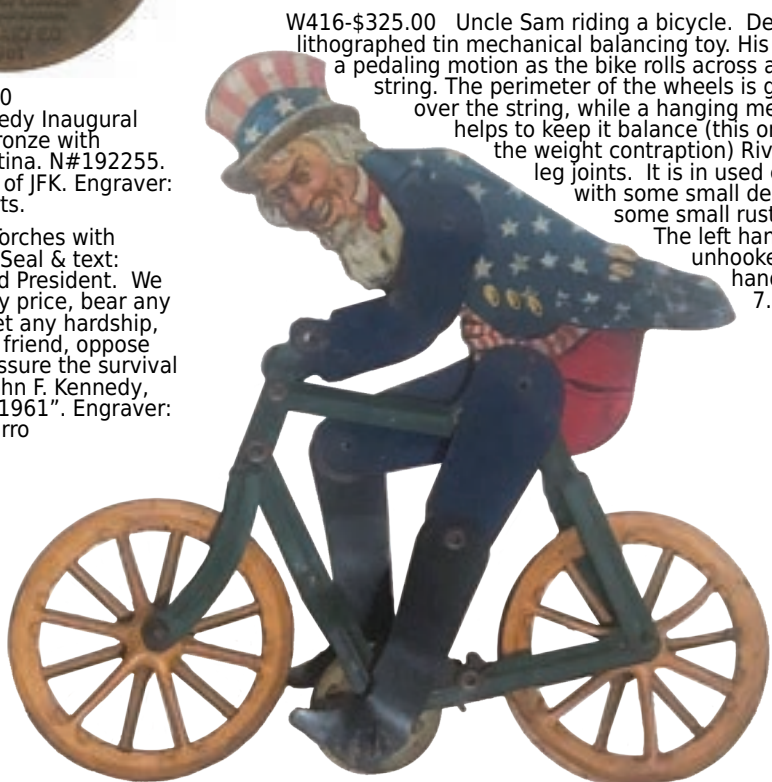

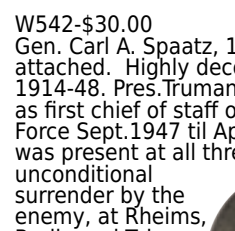

OPPOSING CANDIDATES

Franklin D. Roosevelt had an unusual policy during his campaigns. He never mentioned the name of the opposing candidate, nor did he allow his campaigners to say it.

"Call him the gentleman from _____," FDR would tell his associates with a smile. "Call him our opponent. Call him anything, but never call him bad names. That creates an unfavorable impression among Americans. And never mention his name. Many people, hundreds of people, cannot remember names. If they don't hear the opponent's name, that is a clear gain for us. They have heard my name so often and for so long that it in itself is a political asset, and you can trust them, particularly the Roosevelt haters, to say my name all the time. In the end, lots of people go to the polls and look at the list of candidates and make up their minds after they get to the ballot box. I know that sounds feeble-minded, but I know it to be true. When the voters look over the list they vote for people whose name they know. We don't want to do anything to advertise the name of the opposing candidate."

ELECTING YOUR OPPONENT - OOPS

T.R. campaigned more for war than for Hughes and induced many voters to pick Wilson as the peace candidate. After the election some New York Democrats who had supported Hughes wired a congratulations to T.R. on the election of Wilson, to which, they said, "you contributed more than any other person in America . . . Wilson ought to give you a Cabinet position, as you elected him, beyond doubt . . . You made Wilson a million votes."

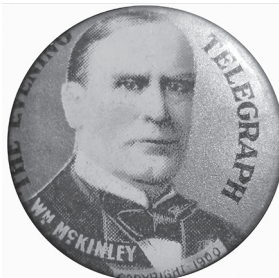

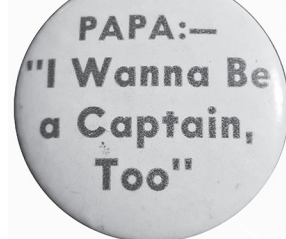
This month we take a look at a few items found on the PME Facebook page. We hope everyone has a happy holiday and a happy new year!

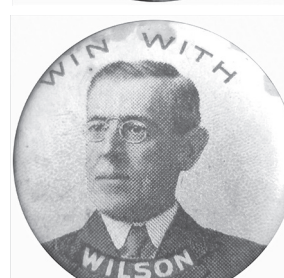
This 7/8" "First Voters Bryan Club" pin is one you don't see available everyday for just \$24. A fantastic combination of color, style and Bryan!

1782 Dec. 5th - Martin van Buren (1782-1862) the 8th U.S. President was born in Kinderhook, New York. He was the first President born after the U.S. Declaration of Independence, making him the first president born as a U.S. citizen. He served from March 4, 1837 to March 3, 1841.

In the presidential election of 1824, the Democratic-Republican Party splintered. Four separate candidates sought the presidency. This splintering had not yet led to a new formal party organization, but later the faction led by Andrew Jackson would become the Democratic Party, while those led by John Quincy Adams and Henry Clay would become the National Republican Party then later the Whig Party.

No candidate received a majority of the electoral vote. So this election is notable for being the only time since the 1804 passage of the Twelfth Amendment where the presidential election was decided by the House of Representatives.

A PRESIDENT ELECTED BY THE HOUSE

When the House of Representatives met on February 9, 1825, to pick a President, it was clear that the vote would be close and that the question of an election on the first ballot turned on the vote of New York. Half of New York's delegation was for John Quincy Adams and the other half was controlled by Martin Van Buren, a Crawford man who was leading the anti-Adams forces. Van Buren wanted a tie in his delegation on the first ballot; it would prevent New York's vote from being cast and thus forestall Adams's election on the first ballot and possibly ensure his eventual defeat.

One of the votes Van Buren was counting on was that of General Stephen Van Rensselaer, the rich and pious Congressman from the Albany district ("the last of the Patroons") who had assured him he intended to vote for Crawford. The old General went to the Capitol on election day firmly resolved to vote against Adams, but on his arrival he was waylaid by Henry Clay and Daniel Webster; they took him into the Speaker's Room and painted a dismal picture of what would happen to the country if Adams wasn't chosen on the first ballot. Van Rensselaer was deeply upset by the encounter and when Delaware's Louis McLane ran into him afterwards he found him practically in tears. "The election turns on my vote," he told McLane. "One vote will give Adams the majority -- this is a responsibility I cannot bear. What shall I do?" "Do!" exclaimed McLane impatiently. "Do what honor, what principles direct. General, you are an old man . . . You want nothing, you have no motive but duty to sway you. Look at me . . . My vote, like yours, would turn the scale. But, General, the greater the responsibility, the greater the honor. Let us march boldly in and do our duty." Rejoined Van Rensselaer: "I am resolved. Here is my hand on it."

But Van Rensselaer wasn't really resolved. He was still perplexed when he took his seat in the House Chamber. Profoundly religious, however, he decided to seek divine guidance while waiting to cast his Crawford ballot and bowed his head in prayer. On opening his eyes, he saw a ticket on the floor bearing the name of Adams. Taking this as a Providential sign, he hastily pocketed his Crawford ballot, picked up the Adams ticket, and put it in the box. The result: New York went for Adams, and Adams won the election on the first ballot.

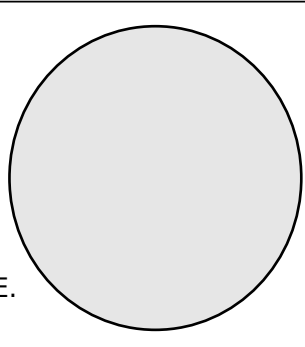

TREASURES on the WEB

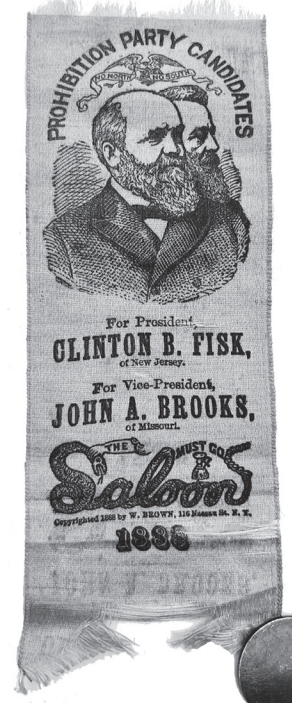
The election is behind us and us collectors have another campaign to collect, forever. When I read old political brochures, I am always amazed how little has changed. The same slogans seem to reappear, and the same concerns remain, and that is the way it is.

As I write this, we have just wrapped up a Heritage, Anderson and Hakes auction all within weeks of each other. As I study prices, there seems to be some flatness among items offered with regularity. I suppose this is to be expected. The unusual, scarce and rare items all seem to be doing just fine. In each auction there were some good buys and some mind-blowing high prices. I seem to have a knack at getting one bumped. eBay seems to be the one place I have a chance. The absence of buyer premiums allows me to bid a little more than I would in the big auctions. One of the big upsides to buying off eBay is that you only pay a small % over the next highest bidder with no added "premium".



1st up is a Henry Clay & Theodore Frelinghuysen 7 1/2" jugate ribbon that sold for \$353 which is in line with past sales. This one looked to be in very good condition.

This Lincoln dated 1861 silk woven inaugural ribbon with "A. Lincoln President" below his portrait, and colorful eagle and shield with "Union for Ever" streamer above was made by Isaac Dreyfus Sons, Basle, Switzerland. This sold as a Best Offer for \$350.



This Grant Colfax hard rubber disk with shank backer sold for \$671. This price surprised me, but I am no expert on this type of item.

I think someone got a good buy on a neat ribbon. It says, "Our Grover President Elect - I am filled with joy over the election of Grover Cleveland". It has drawing of Grover on the side and then goes on to honor the states that voted his way. A fun ribbon that sold for only \$72.

For the prohibition collectors there were several odd ribbons offered this last month. The best is this Fisk & Brooks "The Saloon must go" jugate. It sold for \$1,731. This made me think of Earl Dodge.

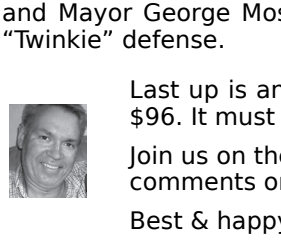
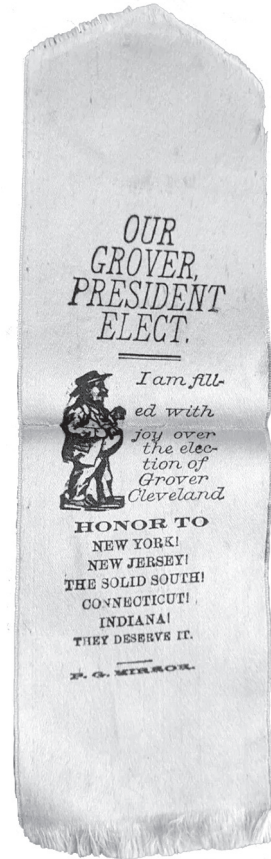
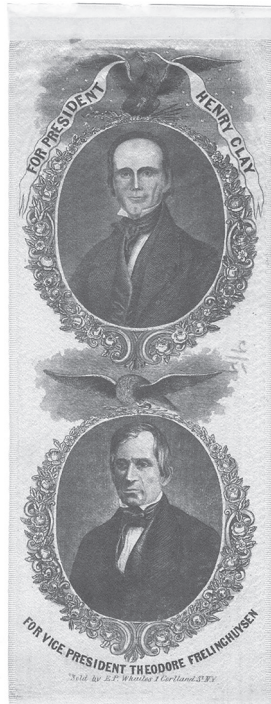
Having collected in MN hard for over 50 years, I can tell you that this "Pipestone Club" McKinley Roosevelt jugate is rare. It took me many years to get one. It almost always comes foxed as was this one (lightly). It sold for \$145.

As I said above, anything unusual does well. This very unusual 1 1/4" Teddy picture pin sold for \$1,324. It had Bastian Bros. back paper.

This 1 3/4" sepia "National Editorial Conference" Parker Davis jugate is a classic. A must have for any Parker frame. This one sold in a group with several other good Parker pins for \$367. It was then sold buy that buyer alone for \$677.

This graphic "Our Country's Choice for Another Term" Teddy sold for \$1,472 which I thought was a steal. It was pictured very poorly. A great item at a very good price. It might be a long time till you see another of these.

This black and white Bryan & A. E. Lee jugate from SD is a strikingly good-looking



item. It sold for \$295.

Called "the Harding signature pin" (because it has his signature), this black and white 1 1/4" Harding is a terrific pin. This one sold for \$410. A nice addition to any Harding collection.

Harding and Coolidge showed up on this 7/8" sepia jugate. This one sold for \$785 which I and other thought was a good buy.

These deep sepia Cox pins come in a variety of sizes from 3/4" up to 2 1/4". Some have metal rims; some are on fobs. I have been working on putting a complete set together, but I am only about halfway there. This 7/8" with metal rim sold for \$152.

Father Cox was a priest who led a group of unemployed men, some with families, to Washington, DC in 1932 to take part in the protests which were staged to get Congress to pay the promised bonus to (largely unemployed) WWI veterans immediately rather than in 1945. This 7/8" "Father Cox's Blue shirts" pinback sold for a Best Offer of \$500.

This 1932 FDR brochure for a "New Deal - New Era - New Leader" had been stamped on the front that it came from Franklin's personal collection. It sold for \$99.

Hidden in a group of mostly very common items was this 1 1/4" "Welcome President Roosevelt" from his visit to Barnesville GA on August 11, 1938. A very rare item that can be matched up with an Atlanta version. The lot sold for \$400.

Coya Knutson was the first woman elected to Congress from Minnesota, and is remembered for the notorious "Coya, Come Home" letter supposedly written by her then-estranged husband, Andy, urging her to give up her seat and not seek reelection in 1958. This 2 1/4" pinback is rare, is almost always foxed, as was this one that sold for \$114.

The best Buy It Now of the month was this 4" Kennedy that sold for \$20. There are several versions of these sample pins made by Bastian Bros. and all are very rare.

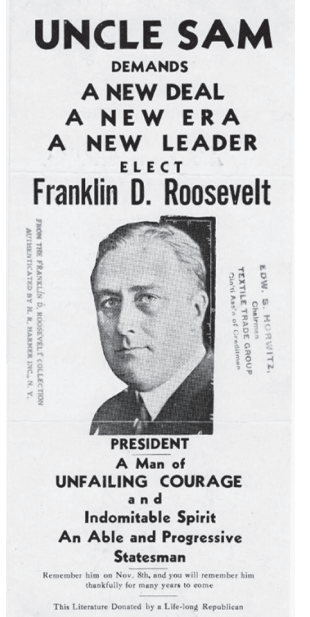
For those who collect 3D items, you must have a Nixon mug. This one was very nice and sold for \$104.

This "Unite and Fight" pin for Dan White who assassinated San Francisco city Supervisor Harvey Milk and Mayor George Moscone sold for \$405. Dan white was also famous for his "Twinkie" defense.

Last up is an odd "Don't Agonize, Organize! Team Pelosi" pin sold for \$96. It must be a tough one.

NAME THAT VEEP TRIVIA

How well did you do naming our Vice Presidents next to the President with which they served?

1 - George Washington-- VP John Adams, 1789-97, 2 terms.

2 - John Adams -- VP Thomas Jefferson, 1797-1801

3 - Thomas Jefferson -- VP Aaron Burr, 1801-05

Term #2 -- VP George Clinton 1805-09

4 - James Madison -- VP George Clinton, 1809-12

This was the first of only 2 times an incumbent VP was re-elected, but a new President was elected. He's also the 1st VP to die in office. As no constitutional provision existed for filling an intra-term vacancy in the vice presidency prior to ratification of the Twenty-fifth Amendment in 1967, the office was left vacant from 1812-13.

Term #2 -- VP Elbridge Gerry 1813-14

The office was vacant again from Gerry's death in office 1814 Nov 23 til the next election in 1817. He is known to be the father and namesake of the political practice of gerrymandering. He's the only signer of the Declaration of Independence who was buried in the nation's capital city.

5 - James Monroe -- VP Daniel D. Tompkins, 1817-25, 2 terms

6 - John Quincy Adams, VP John C. Calhoun, 1825-29

7 - Andrew Jackson -- VP John C. Calhoun 1829-32

This is the second time an incumbent VP was re-elected to office under a different President. Later VP Calhoun ran to fill a SC Senate seat and was elected 1832 Dec 12. Sixteen days later he resigned, making him the first VP to resign from office. and the office remained vacant til the 1833 Mar 4 inauguration of Andrew Jackson's second term when Martin Van Buren was elected as Jackson's second term VP.

Term#2 -- VP Martin Van Buren, 1833-37

8 - Martin Van Buren -- VP Richard Mentor Johnson, 1837-41.

Since no candidate received a majority of the electoral vote in the 1836 election, the U.S. Senate elected R.M.Johnson as Vice President (1837 Feb). This is the only time the Senate has exercised this constitutional authority, granted by the 12th Amendment, which provides, "if no person has a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President."

9 - William Henry Harrison -- VP John Tyler, 1841 (only 1 month)

Pres.Harrison died 1841 Apr the month after he was inaugurated. His VP John Tyler finished the rest of the presidential term (10th Pres).

10 - John Tyler -- NONE. VP office left vacant from 1841-1845.

Tyler is the first VP to succeed to the Presidency after the death of his predecessor. He took the oath of office in a cabinet meeting. His unprecedented ascention to the presidency created political divisions. According to WhiteHouseHistory.org, Callie Hopkins (AU Fellow 2018-2019), "many of Pres. Tyler's political opponents felt that he overreached his position and that he should retain the title of "Acting President." On April 16, Massachusetts congressman and former president John Quincy Adams wrote that Tyler "styles himself President of the United States, and not Vice-President acting as President, which would be the correct style."

Adams and others gave Tyler the nickname "His Accidency."

By June 1, both houses of Congress easily passed resolutions affirming Tyler's status as president, which should have put the matter to rest. However, opponents continued to use the title "Acting President" for the next four years. It appeared in newspapers that were critical of Tyler's policies and on letters sent by political adversaries.

President Tyler returned mail that refused to address him by his proper title unopened. "

11 - James Polk -- VP George M. Dallas, 1845-49

12 - Zachary Taylor -- VP Millard Fillmore, 1849-50

Pres.Taylor died in office 1850 July 9 after only 16 months in office. His VP Fillmore finished his term becoming the 13th President.

13 - Millard Fillmore -- NONE. VP office left vacant from 1850-53.

14 - Franklin Pierce -- VP William Rufus King, 1853

VP King died 1853 Apr 18 and the VP office was left vacant during the rest of Pres. Pierce's term until 1857 Mar 5 at the inauguration of VP Breckinridge & Pres.Buchanan.

15 - James Buchanan -- VP John C. Breckinridge, 1857-61

16 - Abraham Lincoln -- VP Hanibal Hamlin, 1861-65

Term #2 -- VP Andrew Johnson, 1865

Upon Pres. Lincoln's assassination, VP Johnson became the 17th President.

17 - Andrew Johnson -- NONE. VP office left vacant 1865-69.

18 - Ulysses S. Grant -- VP Schuyler Colfax, 1869-73

Term #2 -- VP Henry Wilson, 1873-75

VP Henry Wilson died in 1875 leaving the office of VP vacant from 1875 Nov 22 to 1877 Mar 4.

19 - Rutherford B. Hayes -- VP William A. Wheeler, 1877-1881.

20 - James Garfield -- VP Chester A. Arthur, 1881.

VP Arthur became the 21st President when Pres. Garfield was assassinated a few months into his term.

21 - Chester Arthur -- NONE. VP office left vacant 1881 Sept.19 thru 1885 Mar. 4

22 - Grover Cleveland -- VP Thomas A. Hendricks, 1885.

VP Hendricks died in office. The office of VP was left vacant from 1885 Nov. 25 thru 1889 Mar 4.

23 - Benjamin Harrison -- VP Levi P. Morton, 1889-1893.

24 - Grover Cleveland - VP Adlai Stevenson I, 1883-97.

25 - William McKinley -- VP Garret A. Hobart, 1897-99.

VP Hobart died in office and the VP office was vacant from 1899 Nov. 21 thru 1901 Mar. 4. Hobart expanded the role of the vice president to such an extent that he earned the nickname, the "Assistant President."

Term #2 -- VP Theodore Roosevelt, 1901.

TR became the 26th President upon the assassination of Pres. McKinley 1901 Sept. 14 during McKinley's 2nd term.

26 - Theodore Roosevelt -- NONE. VP office vacant from 1901 Sept. 14 thru 1905 Mar 4.

Term #2 -- VP Charles W. Fairbanks, 1905-09.

27 - William H. Taft -- VP James S. Sherman, 1909-12.

VP Sherman was the 7th VP to die while in office. The office of VP remained vacant from 1912 Oct. 30 thru 1913 Mar 4.

28 - Woodrow Wilson -- VP Thomas R. Marshall, 1913-21, 2 terms.

29 - Warren Harding -- VP Calvin Coolidge, 1921-23

Pres. Harding died while in office and VP Coolidge became the 30th President finishing Harding's term. Coolidge was then elected to a 2nd term.

30 - Calvin Coolidge -- NONE. VP office vacant from 1923 Aug 2 thru 1925 Mar4

Term #2 -- VP Charles G. Dawes, 1925-29.

31 - Herbert Hoover -- VP Charles Curtis, 1929-33.

32 - Franklin D. Roosevelt -- VP John Nance Garner, 1933-41, 2 terms

Term #3 -- VP Henry A. Wallace, 1941-45

Term #4 -- VP Harry S. Truman, 1945

Pres. FDR died early in his 4th term and VP Truman became the 33rd Pres. when he finished FDR's unexpired term.

33 - Harry S. Truman -- NONE. The office of VP was left vacant from 1945 Apr 12 thru 1949 Jan 20 when Truman was inaugurated to his second term.

Term #2 -- VP Alben W. Barkley, 1949-53

34 - Dwight Eisenhower -- VP Richard M. Nixon, 1953-61, 2 terms.

35 - John F. Kennedy -- VP Lyndon B. Johnson, 1961-63

LBJ was sworn in as President following the assassination of Pres. Kennedy becoming the 36th Pres.

36 - Lyndon Johnson -- NONE. VP office remained vacant from 1963 Nov 23 thru 1965 Jan 20.

Term #2 -- VP Hubert H. Humphrey, 1965-69

37 - Richard Nixon -- VP Spiro T. Agnew, 1969-73

Term #2 -- Gerald Ford, 1973-74

Agnew resigned during Nixon's second term when he made a deal to avoid jail time on corruption charges 1973 Oct 10. Under the process decreed by the 25th Amendment to the Constitution, Pres. Nixon was instructed to fill the vacant office of VP by nominating a candidate who then had to be approved by both houses of Congress. Nixon's appointment of Representative Gerald Ford of Michigan was approved by Congress and, on Dec 6, 1973 Ford was sworn in. He became the 38th President 1974 Aug 9, after the Watergate scandal caused Nixon to resign.

38 - Gerald Ford -- VP Nelson A. Rockefeller, 1974-77

39 - Jimmy Carter -- VP Walter F. Mondale, 1977-81

40 - Ronald Reagan -- VP George H.W. Bush, 1981-89, 2 terms

41 - George H. W. Bush -- VP Dan Quayle, 1989-93

42 - William J. Clinton -- VP Albert Gore, 1993-2001 2 terms

43 - George W. Bush -- VP Richard Cheney, 2001-09, 2 terms

44 - Barack Obama -- VP Joesph R. Biden, 2009-17, 2 terms

45 - Donald J. Trump -- VP Mike Pence, 2017-21

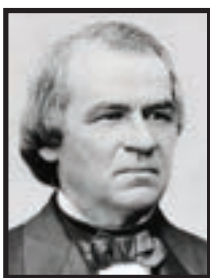
46 - Joseph R. Biden -- VP Kamala Harris, 2021-25

The 25th Amendment to the Constitution regarding presidential succession was passed by Congress 1965 July 6 and ratified 1967 Feb 10. It changed a portion of Article II, Section I. The new Amendment was first applied during the Nixon presidency. Since that time the office of Vice President has been relatively stable.

Woodrow Wilson December 29, 1856

Andrew Johnson (December 29, 1808 – July 31, 1875) was the 17th president of the United States, serving from 1865 to 1869. He assumed the presidency following the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, as he was vice president at that time. Johnson was a Democrat who ran with Abraham Lincoln on the National Union Party ticket, coming to office as the Civil War concluded. He favored quick restoration of the seceded states to the Union without protection for the newly freed people who were formerly enslaved as well as pardoning ex-Confederates. This led to conflict with the Republican-dominated Congress, culminating in his impeachment by the House of Representatives in 1868. He was acquitted in the Senate by one vote.

From The President

The surveys we've been conducting in recent months of both current and former APIC members have revealed a lot of interesting information, ideas and requests. One suggestion that we saw in multiple survey responses was to create a more visible outreach to collectors who participate in the online Political Memorabilia Exchange (PME) on Facebook.



For those of you who don't know, the PME is a group channel that allows anyone on Facebook to post political items for sale on a first-come, first-sold basis. Our research found that the majority of PME participants don't know what APIC is, and many don't know that it exists. In addition, only 40% of APIC members say they participate in the PME.

In mid-November, with the help of PME administrator Paul Bengston, we added a message at the top of the group page explaining the benefits of an APIC membership and encouraging visitors to join. Since the PME has more than 4,200 registered users and the APIC about 1,300 members, I'm hopeful this new message will help some of those collectors see the many benefits of an APIC membership and join us. So far the results are very promising, and I'll share an update in my next column once more data is in.

Another request that was mentioned often in the survey feedback is the ability for members to renew on a longer-term basis than just one year. Well, that option is now available. Simply visit the APIC.us website and click on the membership renewal link. You can then select any term between one year and five years. In addition, if you would like to renew your membership for five years, you'll receive a 5% discount. We're also now offering a 10-year membership renewal with a 10% discount, but to receive that you need to call or email our member services director, Darla Gonzalez, who can process your renewal for you. Either way, we would be happy to welcome your longer-term membership.

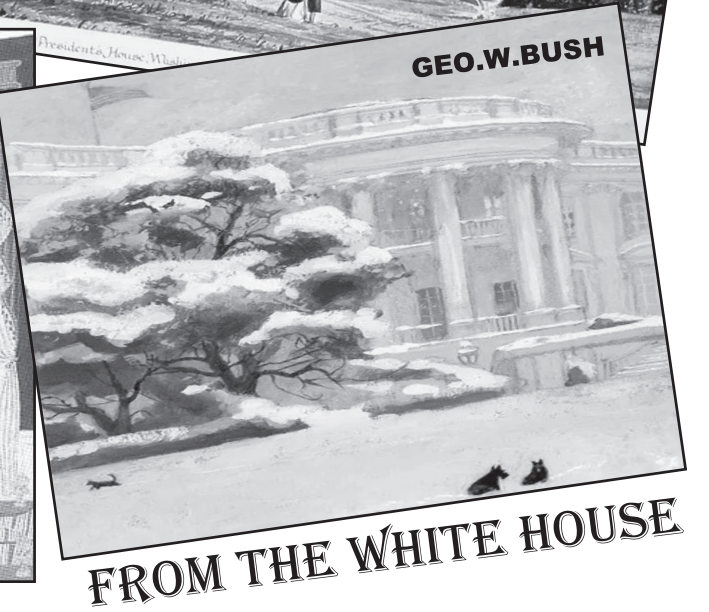
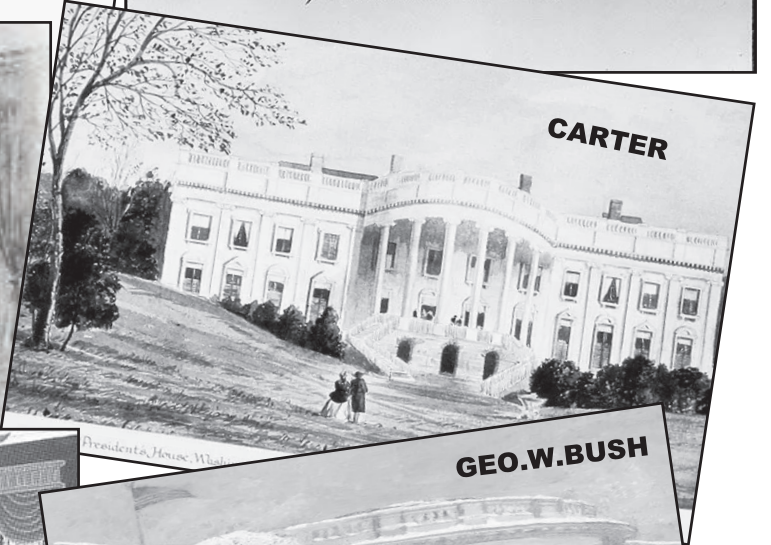
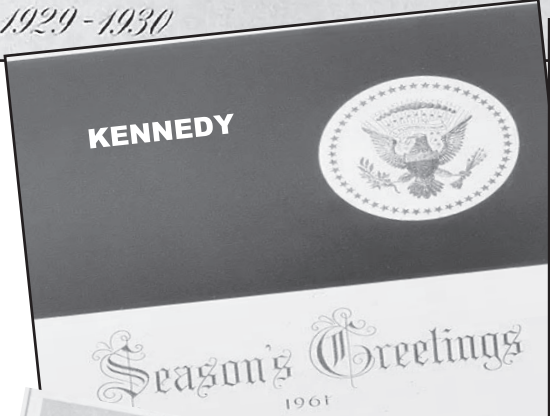
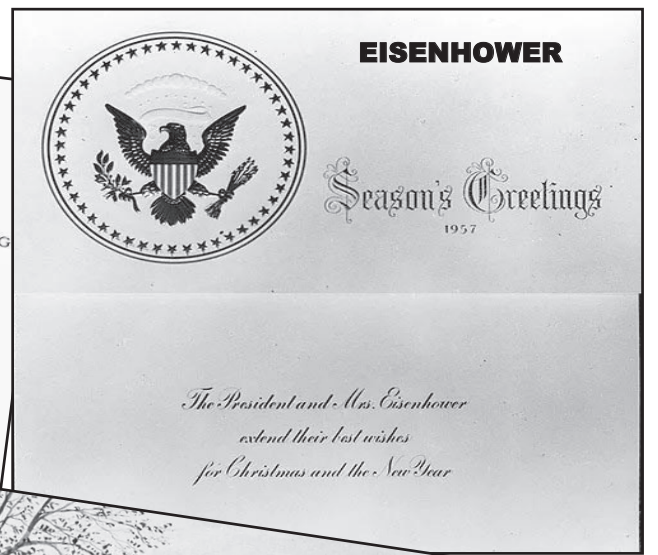
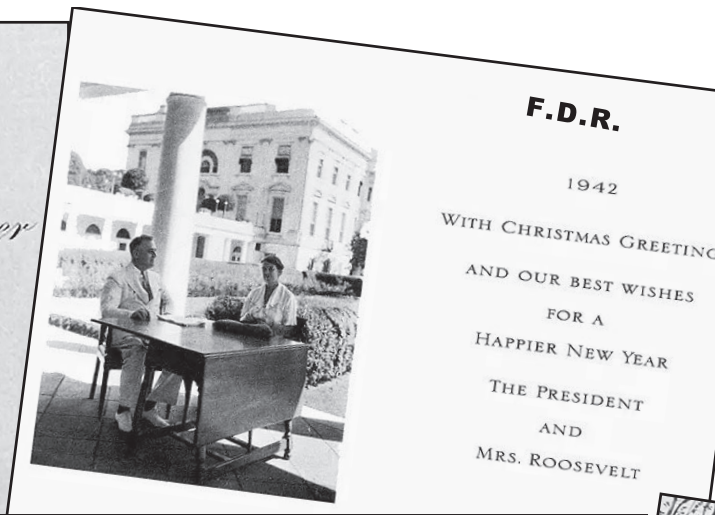
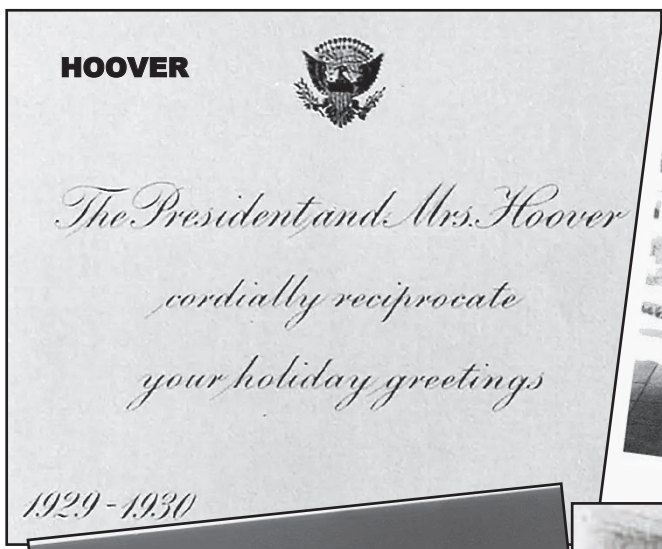

FIRST LADIES - FAVORITE RECIPES

BARBARA BUSH'S MUSHROOM QUICHE

Her recipes can be found in a collection titled *The Bush Family Cookbook*.

INGREDIENTS

- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 ¼ pounds mushrooms, sliced
- 3 green onions, minced
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 3 shallots, minced
- 1 ¾ teaspoons oregano
- 1 ¾ teaspoons basil
- 1 ¼ teaspoons salt
- ¾ teaspoon marjoram
- ¼ teaspoon black pepper
- ¼ teaspoon thyme
- ½ teaspoon dry mustard
- 4 eggs
- ¾ cup whole milk or half-and-half
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pie crust

PREPARATION

- Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
- Melt butter in a large skillet over medium-high heat.
- Saute mushrooms, onions, garlic, and shallots together.
- Stir in seasonings and cook 2 minutes until liquid is evaporated.
- Let cool 5 minutes. In a medium bowl combine eggs with milk or half-and-half and beat well.
- Stir in mushroom mixture and pour into pie crust.
- Bake about 35 to 45 minutes until filling is puffed, set and starting to brown.

Some individual facts from the history of the Vice Presidency:

Jefferson ran against Adams for President. Since he received the second highest electoral vote, he *automatically* became Vice President under the system that existed at the time. In the early years, electors did not differentiate between their votes for president and Vice President, and the runner-up for President became Vice President. In 1800 Jefferson and Burr each received 73 electoral votes, sending the election to the House of Representatives, which selected Jefferson as President. Burr automatically became Vice President. This stalemate led to adoption of the Twelfth Amendment to the Constitution in 1804. The Twelfth Amendment made a series of adjustments to the Electoral College system. For the electors, it was now mandated that a distinct vote had to be taken for the president and the vice president. Further, one of the selected candidates must be someone who is not from the same state as the elector.

George Clinton died in office April 20, 1812 and the Vice Presidency remained vacant until 1813. Elbridge Gerry died in office November 23, 1814 and the Vice Presidency remained vacant until 1817. John C. Calhoun resigned on December 28, 1832 and there was no Vice President until 1833.

Since no candidate received a majority of the electoral vote in the 1836 election, the U.S. Senate elected Richard M. Johnson (left) as Vice President on February 8, 1837. Johnson's election is the only time the Senate has exercised this constitutional authority, granted by the Twelfth Amendment, which provides, "if no person has a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President."

John Tyler succeeded to the presidency on April 6, 1841 with the vice presidency vacant until 1845. Millard Fillmore succeeded to the presidency on July 10, 1850 and the vice presidency remained vacant until 1853. William Rufus King died in office on April 18, 1853 leaving no Vice President until 1857. Andrew Johnson succeeded to the presidency on April 15, 1865 without a Vice President until 1869. Henry Wilson died in office on November 22, 1875 and the Vice Presidency remained vacant until 1877. Chester A. Arthur succeeded to the presidency on September 20, 1881 and the vice presidency again remained vacant until 1885.



Thomas A. Hendricks died in office on November 25, 1885 and there was no serving V.P. until 1889. Garret A. Hobart died in office on November 21, 1899 and the Vice Presidency remained vacant until 1901. Theodore Roosevelt succeeded to the presidency on September 14, 1901 and the vice presidency remained vacant until 1905. James S. Sherman died in office on October 30, 1912 and the VP's office remained unfilled until 1913. Calvin Coolidge succeeded to the Presidency on August 3, 1923 and served without a VP until 1925. Harry S. Truman succeeded to the Presidency on April 12, 1945 and he served without a Vice President until 1949.



Lyndon B. Johnson became President on November 22, 1963 and the Vice Presidency remained vacant until 1965 for the sixteenth time in U.S. History. Spiro T. Agnew resigned on October 10, 1973 and the Vice Presidency remained vacant until December 6, 1973.



To avoid such vacancies in the future and to clarify the presidential succession procedures, Congress passed and the states ratified the Twenty-fifth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution in 1967, allowing for the appointment and confirmation of a new Vice President if such a vacancy occurs. Gerald Ford became the first Vice President to be nominated by the President and confirmed by the Congress as per the Twenty-fifth Amendment. Ford took the oath of office as Vice President on December 6, 1973, and served until August 9, 1974. Finally, Gerald Ford succeeded to the presidency on August 9, 1974 upon the resignation of President Nixon and for a few months the Vice Presidency briefly remained vacant. December 19, 1974 Nelson Rockefeller was appointed Vice President to fill the vacancy left by Ford according to the procedures outlined in the 25th Amendment.

A further comment on the Senate's collection of VP busts... The "Congressional Collection of U.S. Vice President busts" refers to the collection of marble busts of every former Vice President of the United States in the Senate Wing of the U.S. Capitol building which is maintained by the Senate as part of their art collection. The busts are placed throughout the Senate wing of the Capitol. In addition to honoring our VPs, the collection, containing works by many premier American artists also provides wonderful examples of American sculpture from the 19th Century to the present.

Just a note: In most instances, I have capitalized the phrases "Vice President", "Vice Presidents", "Vice Presidential", "Vice Presidency", and "VP". This acknowledges that my reference is to the Vice President of the United States and not some corporate or other vice president.

ONLY VICE

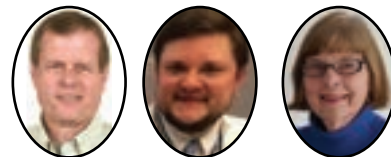
After formally accepting the Democratic nomination for Vice-President, Governor Thomas Marshall of Indiana gave Wilson a book inscribed: "From your only vice, Thomas R. Marshall." Later on he liked to quip: "Once there were two brothers. One ran away to the sea, the other was elected Vice-President, and neither of them was heard of again."

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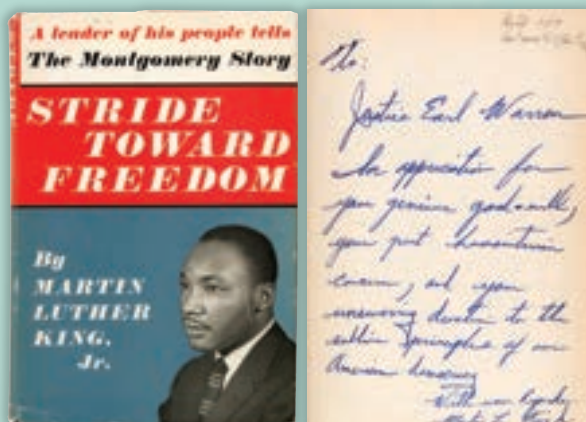
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
